

Tony Dodsworth spoke about the First World War from an unusual angle. He showed us how advertising was used at first to recruit instead of Government conscription. We saw photos of the Sheffield Pals (Middle Class Working Men) and the Barnsley Pals (Working Class Lads who described their Sheffield 'Brothers in Arms' as the The Tea and Cake Lot). He explained how the Hun were always displayed in cartoon fashion whilst our lads were strong and brave.

To the surprise of many he described the bombardment of Scarborough and Whitby from German ships and how Rawmarsh has a claim to fame of being bombed from a Zeppelin - probably blown of course whilst looking for Sheffield. The site became a tourist attraction with folks arriving by the bus load to see the crater. Disaster Tourism in its infancy! However, in WWII Rawmarsh missed out and as a tourist destination it realised it had had its day.

All in all a great night organised by Rtn Anne Willey. Congrats to Anne.

Who Am I

- 1) I was born on 14th March, 1914 in Acton, Middlesex, the son of a tram driver and laundress. I worked as a printer's apprentice and band vocalist, and, after coming of age, started playing drums in London

Nightclubs and touring music halls to earn money to pay for acting lessons.

- 2) I continued my foray into the entertainment industry by working at Butlin's Holiday camps and performing in repertory. I joined the Unity Theatre, where I gained respect as a stage producer. However, my burgeoning career was cut short by WWII when I joined the Royal Army Ordinance Corps. However, I was injured in a explosion during battle training. I returned to acting, and, after getting noticed in a play, began to appear in post-war films. I appeared in films such as "School for Secrets (1946), "The Story of Robin Hood and His Merrie Men" (1952) and "The Ship that Died of Shame" (1955).
- 3) I continued to perform on stage, appearing with Katherine Hepburn in "As You Like It" in 1950, and also used my musical talents appearing in "The Mikado" and "The Threepenny Opera". I wrote songs, musicals and plays over the years, and partnered by Mike Sammes, wrote items recorded by the likes of Harry Secombe and Sir Cliff Richard. In the 1960s, I produced the stage musical, "The Matchgirl", and collaborated with songwriter Tony Russell on the musical "The Matchgirls" about the London matchgirls strike of 1888.
- 4) At this time, I also began to focus on film slapstick, appearing in a number of Carry On films, and the film "On the Fiddle", which also starred Alfred Lynch, John Le Mesurier and Miriam Carlin. In the 1970s, I secured the part for which I will probably always be remembered, when I started playing a character in "Last of the Summer Wine", which I appeared in until my death.
- 5) I was twice married, the first marriage producing my 2 children.

Throughout my life, I was a strong supporter of the Labour Party. I was awarded the OBE in 1976, for my work for the National Association of Boys Clubs, and my role as chair of the Performing Arts Advising Panel. I was also awarded an honorary degree by Bradford University in 1998. I died on 12th July, 1999 in Highgate, London, and was buried in Upperthong, Holmfirth. Following my death, my son joined the cast of the show until it finished.

1. Most people got married in June because they took their yearly bath in May, and still smelled pretty good by June. However, they were starting to smell, so brides carried a bouquet of flowers to hide the body odour. Hence the custom today of carrying a bouquet when getting married.
2. Houses had thatched roofs-thick straw-piled high, with no wood underneath. It was the only place for animals to get warm, so all the cats and other small animals (mice, bugs) lived in the roof. When it rained it became slippery and sometimes the animals would slip and fall off the roof. Hence the saying. It's raining cats and dogs.
3. The floor was dirt. Only the wealthy had something other than dirt. Hence the saying, Dirt poor. The wealthy had slate floors that would get slippery in the winter when wet, so they spread thresh (straw) on floor to help keep their footing. As the winter wore on, they added more thresh until, when you opened the door, it would all start slipping outside. A piece of wood was placed in the entranceway.. Hence the saying a thresh hold.
4. Sometimes they could obtain pork, which made them feel quite special. When visitors came over, they would hang up their bacon to show off. It was a sign of wealth that a man could bring home the bacon. They would cut off a little to share with guests and would all sit around and chew the fat.

5. Bread was divided according to status. Workers got the burnt bottom of the loaf, the family got the middle, and guests got the top, or the upper crust.

6. England is old and small and the local folks started running out of places to bury people. So they would dig up coffins and would take the bones to a bone-house, and reuse the grave. When reopening these coffins, 1 out of 25 coffins were found to have scratch marks on the inside and they realized they had been burying people alive. So they would tie a string on the wrist of the corpse, lead it through the coffin and up through the ground and tie it to a bell. Someone would have to sit out in the graveyard all night (the graveyard shift.) to listen for the bell; thus, someone could be saved by the bell or was considered a ...dead ringer.
