Memories of Olympics past

As I watched the Olympic Torch on its journey through Chapeltown recently my mind went back to the Tokyo games of 1964. I was having breakfast in the YMCA in Glasgow before a day of searching for missing goods on British Railways. The Hostel had a fairly large (for its day) TV screen and the race in progress was the Women's 800 metres, the British runner being Ann Packer. Her storming finish made a lasting impression on me.

In her heat and semi-final she finished fifth and third, running 2:12.6 and 2:06.0 respectively, being beaten by Frenchwoman Maryvonne Dupureur, clocking 2:04.5 and 2:04.5. She thus started the final the slowest of the eight contestants, having raced at the distance only seven times before. Packer was sixth at 400 m, lying behind Dupureur, she was third at 600 m and took the lead in the final straight, using her sprinting speed to take the gold.

She broke the world record with a time of 2:01.1 minutes. Commenting on her win, Packer said "Middle-distance running for women was still in its infancy and the 800m had only been run in Rome four years earlier for the first time. I knew nothing about the event but being so naive was probably to my advantage; it meant I did not have any limitations in my head regarding what I should or could do. Ignorance proved to be bliss."

Later in the same Games Robbie Brightwell won a silver medal in the 4 x 400 m relay. They later married and had three sons, Gary, a 400 m runner

like his mother, and Ian and David, the latter two becoming footballers with Manchester City. She and Robbie were each awarded the MBE in 1965.

My first memory of Olympic Games goes back to 1972 in Munich, where Mary Peters won the Gold in the Pentathlon. I can remember her having to finish close enough to the German to win the Gold, and there was a few minutes whilst the points were added up before she knew she had. And of course, those Olympics were hit by the assassination of a number of Israeli Athletes.
