3rd February – Normal Meeting followed by Council

Trevor's injury wasn't actually due to Skiing, but occurred whilst getting off the Ski lift when a couple of other tourists got in his way.

Rtn Lewis advised the meeting that he met Rtn Mike P in Morrison's, and he passed on Mike's regards to the club.

He also advised that the 2014 scholarship letters will be going out in the next 2 weeks, and asked the club for agreement to supplement the scholarship by £750 . Club agreed to this.

Rtn Anne W asked if any members had underpaid this weeks as the meal price had risen, and Rtn John H had made good the shortfall.

Millionaires Night Cheque Presentation

At the meeting on 17 February 2014 a cheque in the sum of £1,500 was presented to Kirsty Harman, mother of Jessica who is a 17 year old local girl that has Cerebral Palsy, is deaf and blind and suffers from Epilepsy. A couple of years ago Jessica had a Tracheostomy which means that she can no longer use the Hydro Pool at her school or at the Ryegate Centre. Therefore, in June 2013 her mum and other relatives/friends started fundraising to raise £9,000 for a Hydro Bath to be installed at home for Jessica.

The movement of warm water around Jessica helps to relax her muscles from a state of spasm. The family needed £9,000 for the bath – which will be height adjustable – and our contribution took the total to £8,995 so Muhammad threw a “tenner” into the pot to top the target. Thank You Mohammed. Kirsty was overcome with emotion but has promised to send pictures of the bath once it is installed.

local secondary school, and by sponsoring, at £250, a roadshow by the author for the year 8s who will receive the book.

If you could send me the names of local secondary schools with which you have connections, I would be most grateful. Given that Sheffield has just 4 rotary clubs and some 30 schools, we are obviously going to need to deliver to more than one each. I am looking for other funding for the roadshows, and some schools may have budgets for this.

We plan to go to print in February, launching in the first week of March and then to distribute the books and organise roadshows in the weeks following. I will, of course, keep you in touch with developments as they happen, as it looks like the whole project, after 2 years of steady graft, is about to take off.

I look forward to hearing whether your club can help us still further to deliver this major project to your local schools.

Letter received from the DG on the same subject

To Club Presidents and Secretaries, District Executive and Officers

Following the last few weeks of floods in the UK many of you have been asking me what help we can offer other parts of the UK. When we had our own flood problems in 2007 and 2008, other parts of the UK were quick to respond with donations and other help, and I am sure Rotarians will want to reciprocate. I was at RIBI General Council at the weekend, and the following responses were discussed: District 1200, which includes the Somerset Levels has made an appeal for donations. They are on the ground providing immediate response where they can, although some areas have been closed to them for safety reasons. The attached

leaflet shows what help they are giving and where to send donations. Some 5 Rotarian families are known to have abandoned their homes. District Governor Brian Kirkup is personally in charge of a small team to assess cases and decide on awards.

I have had a wonderful offer from a Rotarian in our district to host an affected family for a few days, next week being half term. Is this something any of your club members might consider? If so please contact PDG Robin Brown as shown on the attached leaflet. The RIBI Donations Trust (RIBI DT) is accepting donations for UK flood relief. It is important to make a distinction of purpose between the local District 1200 appeal and the RIBI DT. District 1200 is planning immediate and short term help. The RIBI DT is not usually about short term help - very briefly their criteria specify that help must be for a community and not an individual, it must be sustaining, have PR benefit to Rotary, and has strict reporting requirements. We were very lucky to have a successful application for help from RIBI DT just before New Year on behalf of RC Beverley.

My recommendation is that the local District 1200 appeal is probably the best for immediate and short term assistance as well as some medium term help. I will keep you all informed if appeals are received from other districts. Please keep me copied and up to date with all responses and offers of help so I can collate what is happening.

Who Am I

- 1) I was born on 10th December 1914 in New Orleans of French, Louisianan , Spanish and Irish descent. My parents split when I was very young, and my mother remarried to a man whose surname I ended up using in my chosen profession. I left school aged 14, and worked as a secretary to support myself and my mother. I began entering beauty pageants, and was crowned Miss New Orleans in 1931. Using the prize money to support myself, I worked in a stock theatre company.
- 2) We moved to Chicago, where I worked in a department store before being discovered by Orchestra leader Herbie Kay at a local talent show. I was hired as a singer for his orchestra, and went on tour with him in 1935. This led to work in radio and appearances on 2 popular radio shows. In 1936, I moved to Hollywood, and did a screen test for Paramount Pictures and signed a contract with them.

Cemetery in LA. I have 2 stars on the Hollywood Walk of Fame.

3. I began to appear regularly in films, the first one being "College Holiday" in which I played an uncredited dancer. My second film appearance, in "Jungle Princess" solidified my fame, and was a big hit for the studio. As a result, I became associated with sarongs for the rest of my career. Up until the outbreak of WWII, I appeared in 3 more films – these were "The Hurricane", "Spawn of the North" and "Disputed Passage". During the War, I was amongst the most popular pinup girls among US servicemen and sold war bonds during tours to the public. In 1965, I was awarded a citation, albeit belatedly, for my war bond sales from the US Treasury. I also volunteered at the Hollywood Canteen dancing and talking to soldiers.
- 4) In 1940, I co-starred in the first of a series of films for which I am probably best known with Bing Crosby and Bob Hope. These films were enormously popular throughout the decade. This series ended in 1952 with "Road to Bali". In the 1970s, I was a popular draw on the dinner theatre circuit, and published my autobiography "My side of the Road" in 1980. Throughout the rest of the decade, I performed in plays, and TV shows such as "Hart to Hart", "Remington Steele" and "Murder, She Wrote".
- 5) During the 1990s, I made only a few professional appearances, but was a popular interviewee for publications, TV talk shows and news programs. I was credited as a special advisor for the musical "Swinging on a Star" which was nominated for a Tony Award for Best Musical. I was married twice and had 2 sons by my second husband who died in 1978. I died on September 22nd, 1996 and was buried in Forest Lawn, Hollywood Hills
