PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Before we head into the festive season, November gives us chance to pause and mark the 100 year anniversary of the end of the 1st World war and reflect on the sacrifices of those who have fought and died in the two world wars and all conflicts since.

The recognition of the poppy as the flower of remembrance was inspired by the poem 'In Flanders Field' written by a Canadian doctor Lt Colonel John McCrae following the death of a friend whilst on active service in 1915.

IN FLANDER'S FIELDS

In Flander's fields the poppies blow
between the crosses. row on row,
that mark our place: and in the sky
the larks still bravely singing, fly
scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the dead. Short days ago
we lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
loved and were loved, and now we lie
in Flander's fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw:
The torch: be yours to hold it high,
If you break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flander's fields

Publication of the poem resulted in red silk remembrance poppies being created and sold by an American academic. The British Legion, which was formed in 1921, ordered 9 million and sold them on November 11th that year; raising £106,000. Thereby launching the annual "Poppy Appeal". It is great to see so many Wortley members wearing the Rotary Remembers Poppy Badges.

NEWS

Meetings

1st October – Normal Meeting followed by Council

Other issues covered were:-

- 3) Peak Group clubs had a meeting recently – 2 things were highlighted:-

 - ii) Hearing Ambassadors – a presentation is available to expand on this.

Both issues will be pursued further.

- 4) Indonesian Tsunami – the club will await further information regarding Rotary / District guidance.
- 5) Distribution of Funds – a list of suggestions received so far was read out, and some were discussed / added. Distribution is to be fixed at the Council meeting later.

Rtn Anne advised:-

- i) There are 2 Rotary Poppy badges left if any members require one.

- ii) Joan from Wortley rang regarding the Remembrance Wreath – she has ordered 3 (Stocksbridge, Wortley and Chapelton).
- iii) RBS Bank branch at Ecclesfield is closing. Possible methods of paying in / getting money were outlined. After a brief discussion of other options, it was proposed that we retain the current banking arrangements – this was passed by members.

Rtn Steve P –passed on thanks from Lesley for the card from the club.

Rtn Philip – advised that the Gazebo for the proposed Presidents Night at the 2019 MiTG has been ordered.

Rtn Robert G mentioned that RC of Barnsley are holding their Charter on 20th October at the Holiday Inn in Barnsley. Cost is £16 – other details can be obtained from him.

Rtn Bob G raised an issue regarding the Scholarship awards. A brief discussion followed.

The meeting closed in the usual way.

8th September – Normal Meeting

President Steve opened the meeting. Rtn Robert G advised that he had visited RC of Barnsley as guest speaker, and brought greetings from President Roger and the club.

The President and Rtn Philip reported their thoughts after the recent District Conference which they and other members attended last weekend. Rtn Philip said it was the best one he'd ever been to. Next Year's conference will be held 4th-6th October. President Steve said that there were Good Speakers – it was the 1st Conference he'd attended,

and he would go again. Rtn Anne passed a badge round that she'd obtained for 'Friends of Rotary' and floated the idea of presenting one of these to each 'Friend' the club has.

Rtn Philip advised that the gazebo for next year's MiTG has been reserved. Ticket sales are going well. The pre-booked prices were detailed.

Rtn John E asked whether we should have a sheet in the folder regarding Next Year's District Conference. He also asked what the attendance was like – Rtn Philip reported that there were 40 tables at the Saturday evening do (10 people to a table), and the other sessions were well attended.

journalism for a Paris Newspaper as well as teaching French.

3. On 23rd June, I married one of my students in New York City, and joined French Exile clubs in New York opposing the Imperial regime. After the French defeat at Sedan in the Franco-Prussian war, I returned to Paris. I returned to medical practice and was elected to the National Assembly. I tried but failed to find a compromise between the Paris Commune and French government. After the commune fell, I was elected to the Paris municipal council, retaining my seat for 5 years until 1876. I was elected to the chamber of deputies in 1876, and began my major political career, quickly becoming the leader of the radical section. I also started the 'La Justice' newspaper which became the principal organ of Paris Radicalism.

4. By now, I was known for being a political critic. I led the far left in the Chamber of Deputies. My political career began to wane due to a split in the Radical party, and I lost my seat in the 1893 elections. For the next decade, I confined my political activities to journalism, being an active supporter of Emile Zola in the Dreyfus affair, which further clouded my career. In 1898, I published Zola's "J'Accuse". In 1906, I was appointed as Minister of the Interior, and became Prime-Minister later that year but resigned 3 years later. When WWI broke out, my newspaper was one of the first to be censored.

5. I was a vehement critic of the war-time French government, having declined to join it in 1914 as Justice Minister. After the tribulations suffered in 1917, I was again appointed Prime-Minister. A year later the war ended, and I was heavily involved in the Paris Peace Conference of which I was President. I escaped an attempted assassination in February 1919, and stood down as Prime-Minister in 1920 taking no further part in politics. I gave lecture tours in major American Cities, and was critical of Poincare, Foch and my successors for allowing a German revival. I died on 24th November, 1929 and was buried at Mouchamps in Western France.

Who Am I

1. I was born on 28th September, 1841 in Mouilleron-en-Pareds, Vendée in Western France. My mother was of Huguenot descent, and my father came from a long line of physicians. My mother was devoutly protestant, whilst my father was an Atheist, and insisted that me and my siblings had no religious education. I studied at the Lycée in Nantes, receiving my baccaalaureate in 1858. I then went on to study medicine in Paris, graduating in 1865.
2. Whilst in Paris, I became a political activist and writer, co-founding a weekly newsletter in 1861. I was arrested in 1862 for having placed posters about a demonstration, and spent 77 days in prison. After graduation, I founded several literary magazines, and wrote many articles (most of which attacked the regime of Napoleon III. I left France and went to the USA when imperial agents began to crack down on the dissidents. I worked in New York between 1865 and 1869 following the American Civil War, maintaining a medical practice but working mostly on political
